Costs for spays and neuters are expensive:

Cat Spay \$116, Cat Neuter \$62, Dog Spay \$177-\$250, Dog Neuter \$143-\$201

In 2021, the Wallowa County Humane Society spent over \$26,000 in Spay/Neuter costs for rescued and adopted animals, family pets in need of financial assistance, and free-range cats.

CAROL'S CORNER

Winter's here, and a cold one it is. Many of you already know what I'm about to say as I've talked about it before. It bears repeating for new pet owners or those who've moved here from warmer climes. Here are a few precautions to take to ensure your pet stays happy and healthy during our cold, snowy winters.

Water is necessary in any weather, and pets can become dehydrated without it, just as easily in the cold months as warm. **Be sure your outside pet has access to fresh water**. And avoid using metal food or water dishes in freezing weather to prevent a tender tongue from being harmed.

Increasing food intake may help with providing extra calories during this time, however if your pet is less active in the winter due to weather, **keep a close watch on weight gain.**

Ice, snow, freezing rain and paw pads are concerns. Frostbite can occur in extreme conditions. Keep an eye on your cats' and dogs' feet. Ears and tails can also be affected by frostbite, as there is less blood flow. Be aware

of pale blueish or gray color, blistering, and pain. If you walk your dog on roads or pathways that have been treated with salt, be sure to clean them off when you get home.

Keeping your vehicle running in the winter requires antifreeze, a dangerous product. When ingested by a dog or cat it can cause fatal kidney failure. The taste is appealing to them, so extra precautions should be taken to keep your pet safe.

If your pet has outdoor shelter, unless their bed is heated, **straw** is **the best bedding**. It will not freeze to a pet as a blanket or other material could if it gets wet.

By **banging on the hood of your vehicle** or honking the horn, you might just save a life or two. Cats and kittens like to climb up into a warm engine compartment to warm themselves. Many a feline have lost a leg, tail or life when the engine starts, getting caught up in the fan blades.

Sweaters, coats, boots and heated beds are designed to keep a pet's body warm and more comfortable during the cold weather. Indoors is the most comfortable place and when sharing your home together it also warms the heart.
