### **ELLEN AND PEPPER SAVE THE DAY!**

Pepper, a two year-old Border Collie, and her owner/staff-person, Ellen Bishop, recently were certified as a Search and Rescue (SAR-K9) Air Scent search-dog team, part of Wallowa County Sherriff's Search and Rescue (WCSAR). The certification qualifies them to work in search and rescue work across the nation. Pepper and Ellen join four other WCSAR-K9 teams



that include two certified tracking dogs, one other airscent dog, and a dog certified to find human remains. Pepper and Ellen trained for more than a year before taking the certification test. WCSAR-K9 is in need of volunteer hiders to assist in their weekly training sessions. Boredom... we can suffer from it, and our pets can as well. Destructive behavior can occur when pets become bored. If they are left alone for long periods at a time, they may look for something new and exciting to do--rearranging furniture, pruning houseplants, climbing curtains, tearing up fluffy pillows, these misbehaviors are special delights for some. Those pets that reside outdoors may take up sculpting in the garden or have a taste for wood carving, perhaps on patio furniture or the siding on your house.

While there are a number of pet repellents on the market to help dissuade dogs and cats from these acts, safe, fun toys give pets something positive to turn to. A variety is important, but not all of them at once. Leaving five or six toys of different textures at one time should be enough. Rotate a couple every day or so with ones the pet hasn't seen in a while. Pets can get tired of seeing the same toys day after day. Rotating helps hold their interest. Of course a cherished, favorite toy should be available at all times.

And for house cats, a paper sack or cardboard box is a delight. And a scratching post or larger climbing cat tree is a must. Adding a sprinkling of catnip should keep most cats entertained before a nice nap sets in.
